Challenge 2

Bellatrix's Barbican Music Box

Unlike most beatboxers, Bellatrix has a degree in jazz double bass from the Guildhall School of Music & Drama.

Bellatrix's innovative methods see her using live looping with her voice, bass and synth to conjure up images. In the same way she uses her voice to create new worlds and invent new sounds, she will be working with young people to help them create their own unique sound and find their voice.

'It's important for people to feel that they have a voice, and the students are at an age where many of them are likely to be exploring new ideas and the potential of their voice... being heard can be a privilege that's not available to everyone, and that music and art are often outlets for voices who might otherwise be unheard. Actually I feel that the voices of young people often go unheard, and I am really excited for the privilege to hear what the young people involved in this project have to say. It's not only an opportunity for them to explore their own self-expression, but for other people to hear them.'
