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Help Winnie-the-Pooh Look for Honey



So Winnie-the-Pooh went round to his friend Christopher Robin, who lived behind a green door in another part of

the Forest.

'Good morning, Christopher Robin,' he said.

'Good morning, Winnie-the-Pooh,' said you.

'I wonder if you've got such a thing as a balloon about you?'

'A balloon?'

'Yes, I just said to myself coming along: "I wonder if Christopher Robin has such a thing as a balloon about him?" I just said it to myself, thinking of balloons, and wondering.'

'What do you want a balloon for?' you said.

Winnie-the-Pooh looked round to see that nobody was listening, put his paw to his mouth, and said in a deep whisper: *'Honey!'*

'But you don't get honey with balloons!' 'I do,' said Pooh.

Listen to the story again.

Place the balloon and Winnie-the-Pooh on the ground.

Can you lift the balloon high up in the sky? Move around carefully holding the balloon in the air.

- 3 Ask an adult to blow up a balloon and tie a knot in the end.

Create Your Own Papier Mâché Balloon


Ask an adult to help you find a balloon, needle, newspaper, paint, paper towels or white paper, paper varnish, scissors, string, papier paste or water and white glue.


Follow the instructions below:

- Blow up a balloon and tie a knot in the end.
- 2 Tear some old newspapers into straight strips.
- 3 Mix some white glue and water together, or use papier paste.
- Piece by piece, layer the newspaper strips over the balloon and cover the strips with glue each time.
- **5** Use white paper or paper towel for your last layer to make painting easier.
- 6 Allow the newspaper-covered balloon to dry properly.
- Poke a needle into the balloon to pop it.
- 8 Cut a small hole at the bottom where the balloon was tied, and remove the balloon.
- 9 Start painting your balloon. Be as creative as you can.
- Allow your beautiful balloon to dry, and if needed use paper varnish to seal it.



Use your cut-out and coloured Winnie-the-Pooh from the previous page. Attach him to the bottom of your papier mâché balloon and help Pooh find some honey. When you've finished playing, put your model on display in your bedroom.






Colour in the map of the Hundred Acre Wood.



Look at the Hundred Acre Wood picture and answer the below questions.



Finding Things with Friends

Talk a walk outside with a friend, parent or family member – do not go far without a responsible adult. Discuss the senses like hearing, sight, smell and touch. Find a Thoughtul Spot where you can sit quietly. Take time to use your senses and understand the natural world around you.

Together, collect different leaves and twigs in a pile. Use your senses to explore the leaves and twigs, but do not taste them! "This warm and sunny spot Belongs to Pooh. And here he wonders what He's going to do. Oh, bother, I forgot – It's Piglet's too."

 Hearing Listen to the sound of the trees, and the rustle of the leaves. Can you make your own sound like leaves? 	 Sight Look at the various colours of the leaves. Which colours can you spot? Create your own leaf artwork. 	*
 Smell Do the leaves or twigs smell? Scratch the leaf or twig – does it smell differently now? 	 Touch Compare the feel of a leaf, twig and the bark of a tree. What do you notice? Use adjectives to describe the differences. 	R





Help Winnie-the-Pooh and Piglet Build a House for Eeyore



Read the story below and find your own spot, indoors or outoors, to make a house for Eeyore.

'Well, poor Eeyore has nowhere to live.'

'Nor he has,' said Piglet. 'You have a house, Piglet, and I have a house, and they are very good houses. And Christopher Robin has a house, and Owl and Kanga and Rabbit have houses, and even Rabbit's friends and relations have houses or somethings, but poor Eeyore has nothing. So what I've been thinking is: Let's build him a house.'

'That,' said Piglet, 'is a Grand Idea. Where shall we build it?' 'We will build it here,' said Pooh, 'just by this wood, out of the wind, because this is where I thought of it. And we will call this Pooh Corner. And we will build an Eeyore House with sticks at Pooh Corner for Eeyore.' 'There was a heap of sticks on the other side of the wood,' said Piglet. 'I saw them. Lots and lots. All piled up.'



Top tips to help build a house for Eeyore.

Building Outdoors

- Look around your garden, playground or field for some fallen branches.
- 2 Don't break or cut branches from living trees.
- **3** Find a flat spot to build Eeyore's House.
- Balance the longer branches against a wall, fence or a tree. Or ask an adult to tie branches together to make a freestanding frame.
- **5** Rest other branches against the wall, fence, tree or freestanding frame to build up your walls.
- 6 Eeyore's House was only made of sticks. You could cover the house with some leaves, twigs or fern to make it waterproof.

Building Indoors

- Ask an adult to help you find some blankets and find some furniture you can use to help build your house – you could use chairs, tables or a sofa.
- 2 Arrange the furniture to be the walls of your house – you could use two sets of dining chairs back-to-back, or the back of your sofa and a couple of chairs.
- 3 Drape the blankets over your furniture so you have a roof and some sides to cover your new indoor house.
