Read On Nottingham campaign activity



100 Reads


At the beginning of the year, Nottingham City Council led a successful Ambitious campaign called 'Big Reader? Big Future to encourage children to read for pleasure and demonstrate that it can have a positive effect on mental health and improve academic and career outcomes.

As part of the campaign Read On Nottingham asked the city's primary school pupils, library visitors and social media users to nominate their favourite children's books to create a list of Nottingham's top 100 Reads.

After distributing around 5,000 postcards, Read On Nottingham collated a list split into four age categories of 0-6, 7+, 10+ and 12+. The titles classics such as *The Tiger Who Came to Tea, The Very Hungry Caterpillar, Alice in Wonderland* and more modern choices such as *Gangsta Granny, The Day the Crayons Quit* and *The Dinosaur that Pooped a Planet*.

The school that submitted the highest number of entries was Bluebell Hill Primary School in St Anns, who will be presented with a bundle of books.

Read On Nottingham has designed a height chart featuring all the books to be displayed in every primary school and library in Nottingham. It's also available to download now from the Read On Nottingham website.



Usborne partnership

Read On Nottingham is working with publishers Usborne Children's Books and their *That's Not My...* series.

As well as building on our existing <u>Early Words Together at Two</u> programme, the project will also involve a series of community *That's Not My...* bookgifting events between July until September, where branded materials will also be available.

Councillor Mellen completes his Big Reading Challenge

Congratulations to newly-elected council lead, Councillor David Mellen on completing his Big Reading Challenge in support of the <u>Dolly Parton Imagination Library</u>.



During the 50 day challenge Councillor Mellen read to children in schools, libraries, theatres, bookshops, taxis and the main city council chamber. He even read to children at the top of a windmill.

The final statistics for the Big Reading Challenge were:

- 6,504 children read to in Nottingham
- 166 stories read
- 75 locations
- £5,238 raised (to date)

Reaching his fundraising target means Councillor Mellen has raised enough money to provide 2,500 free books for children – or the equivalent of a whole class of 40 children being able to receive a free book from birth to the age of five!
